

Your article should contain the following elements

Your Title: A Case Report

Authors	<i>Please list in order with degrees, such as MD, DO, PA, DPN, etc.</i>
Key words	<i>List of 3 or more (eg, Chest Pain, Heart Score, Angina, etc.)</i>
Abstract	<i>Introduction, presentation, physical exam, diagnosis, resolution, conclusion</i>

Article – please include each of the following headings

Introduction	<i>Optional</i>
Case Presentation	<i>Symptoms, history, exam, vital signs, urgent care findings and testing; include only what is relevant to the diagnosis or discussion</i>
Medical Decision Making	<i>Thought process to prioritize diagnoses and considerations for further evaluation</i>
Differential Diagnosis and Final Diagnosis	<i>Describe final diagnosis and the care setting where it was determined; include differential if any were considered</i>
Discussion	<i>Practical insight from the case; consider epidemiology, history, presenting complaint, exam, diagnosis, and management</i>
Disposition	<i>Include actions (eg, emergency department referral, sent home, etc.)</i>
Patient Perspective	<i>Include if relevant (eg, "Patient did not believe treatment was helping.")</i>
Ethics Statement	<i>Required* – see below</i>
Takeaway Points	<i>Short summary bullets of key points as detailed in the article text</i>
References	<i>Numbered in the order they appear, in American Medical Association style</i>

***Ethics Statement Information For Authors:** The patient should be contacted to confirm consent to publication of their case. If the patient is unreachable, include a comment explaining efforts to reach the patient nonetheless. Written consent is preferred and can be obtained and documented with your institution's standard patient consent form.

- *"Patient provided consent for publication of this case."*
- *"Patient was unable to be contacted because XXX (eg, death, lost to follow-up), and therefore demographics and some details of the case were changed to protect patient anonymity and confidentiality."*

Images: Images can be included if the patient provides consent, or absent consent, if the images are not identifiable and the author created/captured them. Only high-quality images can be published.

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Please use this as a guide to using references in your article submission

Do

- Include references to support factual statements
- Ensure the reference material you cite directly supports your assertion—it is the author's responsibility to read and understand the cited material
- Cite literature published in the last 20 years, preferably in the last 10 years
- Cite high-quality, peer-reviewed, scholarly sources (eg, *JAMA*, *Pediatrics*, *British Medical Journal*, *Journal of Infectious Diseases*, etc.)
- Cite the *original* primary source rather than a subsequent reference
- Cite the most recent guidelines or policies from official organizational websites (eg, American Academy of Pediatrics, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention)
- Consider using academic search engines (eg, PubMed, Web of Science, Scopus, Google Scholar)
- Use American Medical Association style to format all references—note that links by themselves are not complete references and many "copy-and-paste" reference citations are not in the correct format (*Example of correct format: Yu KT, Green RA. Critical aspects of emergency department documentation and communication. Emerg Med Clin North Am. 2009 Nov;27(4):641-54.*)
- Arrange and number the references in the order they appear in the text
- Use endnotes, rather than footnotes
- Add the source in the appropriate location in the text using parentheses (Weinstock, 2013), or alternatively, use the respective numbers of each reference as superscripts within the text.¹

Don't

- Cite StatPearls or secondary sources
- Cite scholarly literature older than 20 years *unless* there are no other recent sources
- Cite materials such as textbooks or UpToDate
- Cite consumer news sources for scientific evidence
- Cite sources that you have not read or do not understand
- Arrange references in alphabetical order

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
